L.A.C.A. had its genesis during the devastating tragedy of the World Trade Center. L.A.C.A., since day one, has provided numerous chaplains to assist firefighters and police officers in dealing with the traumatic events which surrounded this tragedy. L.A.C.A. was also instrumental in



assisting families of American Airlines flight 587. L.A.C.A. chaplains were the first to be present in helping these families through their grief. Presently L.A.C.A. is working with police precincts, fire stations, City of New York Cadets Corps, Rikers Island correctional facility, rehabilitation programs and several hospitals along with many similar organizations throughout the entire U.S.A. through its many chapters.

Pastors can use their influence from the pulpit and in pastoral settings to promote healthy

behaviors and lifestyles. They can encourage members to prioritize their physical and mental well-being, leading to a healthier community.
